ADMISSIONS POLICY

The ADMISSIONS POLICY for Vocational Schools ranks students by

- GRADES
- ATTENDANCE
- DISCIPLINE
- GUIDANCE COUNSELOR RECOMMENDATIONS
- INTERVIEW (optional)

Vocational Schools are allowed to operate a LOTTERY instead, but NONE of them do that. **ALL USE THIS RANKING SYSTEM.**

POLICY IMPACT


These admissions factors result in

- Racial Discrimination
- Higher proportions of students of color, English learners, students with disabilities, and economically disadvantaged students are made ineligible.

While Vocational Schools are public schools, the use of ranking **does not ensure equal opportunity** in the admissions process.

No other public schools in the state, except Boston's exam schools, have such ranking systems for students.

Will the Baker Administration make major changes needed OR continue discrimination and lack of equal opportunity? Analysis of DESE data shows disparities for almost ALL vocational schools:

Comparison points for Students of Color, ELL, Eco-Disadvantaged, Special Needs

vs. students not in those groupings

REGIONAL VOCATIONAL TECHNICAL SCHOOLS (RVT, 24 schools)

In 89 of 91 comparison points, or 98%, a greater percent of more privileged students were offered seats than their peers from historically marginalized groups. Analysis of DESE data shows disparities for almost ALL vocational schools - continued:

In 71 or 78% of comparison points,...was more than five percentage points less than their more privileged peers.

In 56 or 62% of comparison points,...more than 10 percentage points less than their more privileged peers.

In 28 or 31% of comparison points,...more than 20 percentage points less than their more privileged peers.

Analysis of DESE data shows disparities for almost ALL vocational schools - continued:

In 19 of the 24 vocational schools or 79% had at least one comparison point in which the percent of students from historically marginalized groups were offered seats at a rate that was more than 20 percentage points lower than their more privileged peers.

NEW ADMISSIONS POLICY

"by allowing individual schools and programs to set policies that respond to the needs of their sending communities and **are consistent with applicable federal and state laws and regulations to promote equitable access for all students, while retaining the Department's role to monitor compliance and intervene when necessary.**

"that vocational schools and programs using selective criteria shall not use criteria that have the effect of disproportionately excluding persons in protected classes unless they can demonstrate that (1) the criteria have been validated as essential to participation and (2) alternative equally valid criteria that do not have such a disproportionate adverse effect are unavailable."

NEW ADMISSIONS POLICY - continued

This **SHOULD** lead to significant numbers of more of these students being admitted:

--Students of Color,--English Language Learners--Special Needs students--Economically Disadvantaged students

HOWEVER,

This **WILL** require on-going pro-active review by DESE and action against any newly submitted Admissions Policy IF it still tries to keep aspects of the current discriminatory ranking system.
